Midterm: A midterm examination will be held on *Wednesday, February 15*, in class.

Tests: There will be two tests, held during recitations in the weeks of *January 23* and *March 12*.

Assignments: Problems will be assigned and completed during every recitation, except in the weeks of January 23, February 15, and March 12. Collaborative work on these problems is encouraged and the recitation instructor will provide guidance. There will be a total of eight such assignments. The best 7 of 8 scores will be factored into your final grade as indicated below.

Evaluation: Your final grade in the course is based on 7 recitation assignments, 2 tests, a midterm, and a final exam. A final numeric grade will usually be computed according to the following formulae:

| | <i>Distribution</i> |
|-------------|---------------------|
| Assignments | 14% |
| Test #1 | 6% |
| Test #2 | 10% |
| Midterm | 25% |
| Final Exam | 45% |

However, in exception to the above table, a grade of less than 25% on the midterm exam or a grade of less than 40% on the final exam will result in a failing grade in the course.

Letter Grade Equivalents: Numeric grades will be converted to standard letter grades as outlined by Academic Regulation 5 in your 2011-2012 Academic Calendar.
